Winter is a good time for some healthy contemplation; so, our scripture reading situates Jesus in the desert 40 days and nights in preparation for his public ministry. And then, in Jesus' hunger, Ol' Scratch offers him the three temptations. The readings offer a real opportunity for us to reflect on the temptations in our business and public life. This is an election year, and the temptations abound. So let's examine our public discourse by engaging "It's Election Season. Here Comes the Morally Charged Language," by William Brady, Kobi Hackenburg, and Manoa Tsakiris. Between Scripture and the article, you might generate some heat in a civil way.

I have read a good deal on the Ignatian concept of discernment, but in January, I picked up Henri Nouwen's book Discernment (2013) published by the Henri Nouwen Legacy Trust long after his death. Henri was a remarkable priest, spiritual writer, and human being. Being snowed in gave me time to recall having met Henri in Boston and then hearing him speak a number of times in Chicago. His books Reaching Out and With Open Hands are 20th-century classics. If you are looking for a book to jump start your spiritual life in 2024, Discernment really worked for me.

REFLECTION

Be attentive: Listen to the "morally charged language" in the media as we move through the primary season. Make connections between the scripture readings and the three temptations for bread/money/the needs of the flesh, power, and reputation versus public service and good governance.

Part B alternative: You might consider having a conversation about the business temptations you have faced in your careers and the lessons learned.

Be intelligent: How are you filtering the barrage of messaging?

Be reasonable: How do you cope? How are you evaluating the morally charged language and, finally, are you able to contribute to good civil dialogue?

Be responsible: What where key insights that surfaced in today's discussion? Any food for further contemplation? Any action steps? What are the implications for you at work, in your community, and at home? Leverage the conversation for good!
