




IBC Newsletter

The second book is that of a colleague with the Ignatian Legacy Fellows, James Briggs. His book, What's Next in Your Life? A Spiritual Guide to Retirement and Purposeful Aging, is a short (93 pages) impactful read with exercises for reflection for those moving toward or in retirement or "re-wirement." I saw how Jim's wisdom helped our legacy leaders in their journey into retirement. One new fellow said upon reading it, "John, the quotes alone are worth the price of the book!"

Remember, we live in a rational, scientific, linear world, and we live within a story that began in a garden and leads to eternal life.
