So I write from another lovely Chicago suburb and recommend that, before coming to your next meeting, you read the three-page Book of Jonah in the Old Testament—a good story to accompany our reading, "What Jaws can teach us about employee engagement 50 years on."

In the spirit of summer reading, I want to introduce you to the writing of a former WSJ and Washington Post reporter, poet, contemplative (Benedictine tradition), and retreat director, Judith Valente (St. Peter's College/University grad and honor's degree recipient).
